Dear CSRI Conference Attendees:

On behalf of the Department of Sport and Entertainment Management (SPTE) at the University of South Carolina, and the Executive Board members of the College Sport Research Institute (CSRI), we want to welcome you to CSRI's 11th annual Conference on College Sport.

As it has for a decade – this year's conference will provide impactful college-sport research presentations, lively panel discussions, and provocative keynote speakers. We will enjoy three days of friendship, collegiality, and heated discussion about college sport issues.

This conference has never been – and never will be – simply an opportunity to promote a particular agenda. We encourage all attendees to systematically seek their own answers to the various issues facing the college sport industry. Our primary goal is not that every attendee agrees on specific policy issues or solutions to problems but rather that everyone who attends has an opportunity to be presented with information that better informs their opinions. While we may disagree on solutions (sometimes heatedly and loudly), we hope every CSRI conference attendee has always felt welcomed and respected.

CSRI's three-part mission is simple: (1) encourage and support interdisciplinary and interuniversity collaborative college-sport research, (2) serve as a research consortium for college-sport researchers from across the United States and throughout the world, and (3) disseminate college-sport research.

While we, along with Woody Eckard (and a cadre of research assistants over the years), are proud CSRI's Adjusted Graduation Gap (AGG) Reports have informed litigation and ongoing national graduation-rate discussions, we are just as pleased that a great deal of CSRI attendees' research has been disseminated nationally and added to the growing body of college-sport knowledge. Attendees should be proud of the great work that has been presented at this conference over the past 11 years.

In addition, since 2008 the Journal of Issues in Intercollegiate Athletics (JIIA) has evolved into a highly-respected, peer-reviewed academic journal. The journal's current editor – Dr. Chad Seifried – has dramatically improved the journal's rigorous standards. We are excited that Dr. Thomas Aicher and Dr. Joseph Cooper have agreed to serve as Co-Editors as Dr. Seifried transitions from the editor's role. Their leadership of an outstanding editorial review board will continue to move the JIIA in a positive direction. In 2017, 11 refereed articles were published in the JIIA, continuing a strong tradition of high-quality manuscripts.

As we look forward to CSRI's 12th year, an going CSRI focus will be the CSRI Archives. Working with the University of South Carolina University Libraries – Special Collections, CSRI has already obtained several special collections of valuable college-sport documents, film, memorabilia, records, and digital items, with the acquisition of additional collections to be finalized shortly. One of the highlights of the 2018 CSRI Conference will be the dedication of Mary Willingham's papers on Friday evening. Our long-term goal of this endeavor is to grow the CSRI Archives into the most extensive college-sport archives in the United States.

While we are excited for CSRI's future, after a decade of CSRI conferences and JIIA issues, more than anything we want to thank all of you for your support, loyalty, and friendship.

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





The Jerry and Lois Tarkanian Collection was the initial donation to the College Sport Collections. It was donated to UofSC by Coach Tarkanian's family to honor the legacy of the late Hall of Fame coach and player advocate. The collection includes NCAA v. Tarkanian U.S. Supreme Court case documents, as well as practice plans, photos, regalia, mementos, children's books and other material related to Coach Tarkanian's coaching legacy.

The College Sport Collections also include the papers of Mary Willingham who documented and exposed what is known as the longest running athletic and academic fraud case in the history of college sport. The Tarkanian and Willingham Collections offer rare glimpses behind the NCAA's Blue Disk at the business of college sport. Additional collections will be added over time, creating the nation's most extensive and prestigious inventory of college sport artifacts.
